The mandolin in Irish Music

The mandolin is underrated and underused in Irish music, in my opinion, which is unfortunate because it is perfectly suited to the music's ornamentation and rhythmic emphasis. The mandolin is similar in size to the fiddle, and the neck of mandolin and fiddle are almost identical. The string tuning is the same as the fiddle, so fiddle tunes can be played easily. The mandolin has a sweet, beautiful tone. But in Ireland, the banjo is more likely to be seen in sessions, because it has a louder voice, and it's an octave lower in register, thus making it more prominent in a session. Yet if you are not concerned about being "loud" then the mandolin works well. There is something pleasant about the tone of a mandolin, and I hope to hear more of it in future sessions, here in Winnipeg. Between the banjo and the mandolin, the banjo will probably continue to be the favoured instrument in Ireland, but let us also appreciate the wonderful mandolin.
